Please take a few minutes from this hectic season of snow and ice to read about the many changes playing out in our municipality.

Township Committee Meetings

The Township Committee held meetings on January 5th and January 19th. The January 5th meeting was the annual "re-organization" meeting. New Committeeman Peter Mancuso was sworn in to office, and many of the appointments to Boards, Committees and other positions were announced.

I would have provided you with the internet links to the meeting agendas on the Township web site as I have done in the past. However, it appears the Township has ceased posting the meeting agendas online. I have not seen one on the website in several months. Likewise, the Township calendar and listings of board and committee meeting dates are not posted.

It is very disappointing that the Township appears to have decided that communicating with and giving advance notice to the public is not a priority. We have regressed to the way it was before I became a Committeeman: the only way to have any idea of what is going on in the municipality is to somehow know when to attend a meeting and to be there, in-person.

It should be noted — that Morris Township, once again, has an all-Republican Township Committee. Once again we are without a single member to provide balance and a competing point of view. This is a very disappointing and troubling development. It should trouble everyone – including Republicans. I believe that government needs "checks & balances" at all levels, including the local level. We are without checks and balances in Morris Township once again.

New Police Chief

At the January 19th meeting, our new Chief of Police, Dennis Reilly was sworn in. The entire police force was assembled in service dress uniform, and Reilly was greeted by a color guard. Reilly has been with the Morris Township Police Department for 23 years, the last 3 as a Captain of our force. After he was sworn in, Reilly gave a very warm speech that lasted about 20 minutes. Morris Township residents are lucky to have such a fine leader in Chief Reilly. I congratulate him and know he will

Proposed Honeywell Development Project

Another big piece of news in town is the proposed redevelopment of the 147 acre Honeywell company office complex on Columbia Road.

The Morris Township Planning Board will hold its next hearing on this matter on Monday February 7th. The Planning Board previously held a Special Meeting on November 29 to review details of Honeywell International's plans to redevelop the site that houses its headquarters. About 150 people turned out, the largest turnout for any meeting in Morris Township that I can remember!!

Honeywell, which employs 1,200 people at the Columbia Turnpike site, filed a proposal with the planning board requesting a rezoning of the property from Office/Lab to mixed use.

There are no detailed development plans at this time, just "concept plans". The first step for Honeywell is to get the mixed-use rezoning passed. Then they would come back for new and separate hearings on specific development proposals. The only part of the plan that seemed fairly certain was that they would be demolishing 8 of the current 11 buildings at the site. It appears that if the site were rezoned, Honeywell would sell the plots not intended for their own use to developers.

There are two conceptual General Development Plans under discussion:

- One version calls for 893,000 square feet of office space, a 250 room hotel measuring 162,500 square feet and 313 town houses totaling 615,500 square feet. A graphic of the proposed layout can be found here:

- Another plan calls for 825,000 square feet of office space, the hotel, 230 townhouses and a continuing care retirement community consisting of 416 units. This layout can be seen here:

A fiscal analysis report presented by the developer said the project could produce \$3.6 million in additional revenues for the township, school system and county, compared to what the property currently produces in property tax revenues. The Township's portion of the revenues from that



land would rise from \$336,000 currently to a projected \$1.29 million, the report said. The hotel is projected to pay annual taxes of \$275,000, the report said.

Despite the large number of townhouses proposed, the "expert witness" for Honeywell said only 39 children are projected to live in there, a finding that was met with skepticism by many of the residents attending the meeting.

I personally have some major concerns with this development, which I commented on at the public meeting on November 29:

- 1.** The development is too intense and too dense for Morris Township. Our community is one of single-family homes. Many of us moved here for the open spaces. This project will crowd a lot of people onto a small piece of land and will put many more cars on our already congested local roads. Some people may be seduced by the promise of increased tax revenue, but it would come with a cost: lowered quality of life. Some would argue this is priceless.
- 2.** The costs to the municipality could possibly outweigh the benefits. All of this new building will require municipal services. At a time when we have cut-back on our police department, fire department, Department of Public Works, etc. in order to balance the budget, this new development will require us to add back personnel and possibly require the purchase of new equipment – all of which has a cost. Further, if the school system cannot handle the influx of new schoolchildren then the entire school district would be left with the large expense of building a new school. (Note: this has not yet been verified, but I would love to hear from the school district on this)
- 3.** If the condominiums do not get sold in this terrible real-estate market then the municipality could be left with a real eye-sore of a partially built development project. (The Township already has two examples of unfinished "eyesore" townhouse developments on Old Turnpike Road and on Deborah Drive – and we do not need more!)

Some residents are also concerned about possible soil contamination at the site from when it was owned by Allied Chemical (predecessor to Allied Signal, which then merged with Honeywell), and if that could contaminate the ground-water if it got disturbed after all these years. The developer promised that appropriate testing would take place prior to any construction.

Petition against Honeywell development

I have been informed of an online petition circulating. The petition states:

"We, the undersigned, urge Honeywell international and the Morris township government to NOT alter existing zoning at Honeywell International's (101 Columbia Turnpike Morristown NJ) and NOT to engage in a long term general development plan for the area.

Rezoning is inconsistent with community and state master plans for our area. Further, we call for a more realistic analysis of rezoning changes impact on TRAFFIC, POPULATION DENSITY, TAX BURDEN AND ENVIRONMENTAL PRESSURES that will negatively change the LIVABILITY of this

area and set a dangerous zoning precedent for Morris Township and our state. We register our disagreement with rezoning and unforeseeable consequences of a general development plan for this area.

We also note the potential negative consequences to our land and watersheds from development of the contaminated ponds and soil on the property."
